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Monitoring Respiratory Rate at Home

- 1. Choose a time when your pet is sleeping.
- 2. Count respirations for **15 seconds**. Each respiration is the movement of the chest out and in again.
- 3. Multiply your count during the 15-second interval by 4 to obtain the **respiratory rate per minute** or **breaths per minute** (bpm).

A normal respiratory rate is generally less than 30 or 40 breaths per minute. There is no lower limit and rates lower than 15 bpm may be recorded, especially during sleep.
